quickly transitioned to Optis by the second day. Once in the Optis, they were able to master their own vessel with an instructor in a nearby motorboat. With the energy and enthusiasm this class brought every morning, they were able to learn all of the basic sailing skills such as tacking and jibing, points of sail, and right-of-way within the first week and put it all together during the second week, when the majority of them returned. During the second week, even the Rhodes 19 made an exciting trip on 'Fun Friday.'



Intermediate students applied what they learned from the Beginner class. Taking to Hunters, Optis, or 420s, they practiced tacking and jibing on the whistle, man overboard drills, and trimming their sails for upwind sailing.

Our newly extended Racing Class began on the second week to last an additional week this season. They all worked really hard to learn a great deal of information in a very short period of time to prepare to travel to a larger race next week. They will be competing against many other sailors along the coast of Maine, and even teams from New Hampshire. It will take place on Peak's Island and will be a fun, first-time experience for the students.

The Pancake Breakfast and Silent Auction was a huge success with a total of 244 people who attended. We had several larger items available in the auction this year: a Howmar12 sailboat, a Dyer sailing dinghy, a 3hp Nissan motor that previously belonged to the Rhodes 19, and a week's stay at a guest house in Florida that was donated by AFSS parents. With a wonderful turnout of volunteers to set up, prepare and serve the breakfast as well as clean up, everything went smoothly.
