

Family Life with Schooner Alert

"Living with Boats" is a new feature in OBYC Happenings, profiling club members and their boating lives.

Bethany McMillen-Davis learned about boats growing up on Bailey Island. Perry Davis learned about boats as a young man working as a Colorado River whitewater rafting guide.

Today, their personal and boating lives are merged in one of the iconic activities of the region: operating the 67-foot wooden schooner Alert. They have run the 29year old, gaff-rigged, two-master as a charter sailing vessel since 2013. Alert leaves Cook's dock and raises its sails as many as three times a day during the busy summer season, carrying hundreds of tourists out into Casco Bay.

Bethany, now 41, grew up in her parents' rental-cottage compound, Sea Escape, where the couple now live with their daughters Margaret, 8 years old, and Calypso, 4. Like many island children, Bethany learned to sail at Orr's Bailey Yacht Club. Margaret will attend the sailing school this summer.

As a teenager Bethany crewed on various boats, and she raced in the program at Roger Williams University in Rhode Island while studying for an architecture degree. When jobs didn't materialize after college she taught sailing in summer camp and started crewing in the Penobscot Bay schooners that sailed out of Camden and Rockland where she eventually met Perry in a pub.

Perry's route to schooner entrepreneurship was even more varied. One year he was asked to help deliver a schooner from the Virgin Islands to Newport RI. It was his first East Coast experience, and he discovered he liked sailing. For the next ten years he worked and sailed from the Caribbean to Nova Scotia and even in



Europe where he did sailing scenes in the 2002 movie, *The Count of Monte Cristo*. Later he became the pilot of the year-round Monhegan ferry out of Port Clyde.

"I never found a better place to sail than the coast of Maine," he says today.

Perry, now 43, and Bethany found courtship difficult. They usually worked on different schooners because many captains avoided hiring couples. Eventually they bought a wooden boat, Tevake, that they sailed to the Bahamas, where they spent a winter living aboard. When winter ended, Perry was hired to bring the schooner Appledore north and Bethany sailed Tevake with a single inexperienced crew member.

For several years, they operated Tevake as the first sailing charter in Bailey Island, but it was limited to six passengers. After a slow start, in several years, "we were doing private charters every nice day," Bethany recalls.

In 2012, the couple decided to buy a bigger boat. There was a schooner in Portland that had been built in York in 1992, but then neglected by its owner for years. It had been refurbished as a fishing boat by a local lobsterman who loved wooden boats, and the Davises convinced him to let them buy it and convert it for passengers.

After various modifications, and passing the Coast Guard engineers' stability test they started operating it as a charter in September 2013.

"Every year has been a little better than the year before," Bethany says, although last year Covid restricted capacity to just 15 from the normal maximum of 28 on the ship. Typically the ship carries 18 people on public trips and up to 28 on private trips where groups are presumably already friendly. A similar size schooner in Portland carries up to 45 people. Typically they run three 2-hour trips a day for \$50 per adult -- at 10:30, 3 pm and 6:30 for a Sunset cruise. But they are flexible and run trips up to six hours for \$120.

The support of Cook's for area charter boat operators including Alert has been crucial to the success of the business, Bethany says. In addition, area fishermen and lobstermen are respectful of the Alert and the Davis's dedication to wresting a living from the sea.

Perry says that old fishing and coasting schooners were first converted for passengers in the 1930s. "They were regarded as a dude ranch on the water," where urban escapists could experience a passing way of life. He enjoys the idea that they are carrying on the Maine maritime traditions. "There are probably 30 working schooners in Maine. The boats have just found new cargoes."
