
Additionally, all of the wooden crib work needs to be laid down on the lawn .

Social Committee Report

The 2017 OBYC social calendar is almost complete. Social Committee co-chair Joyce Duda said it has been a successful season with major Saturday night events every two weeks attracting 50 to over 170 people.

In addition, the club hosted six lectures attracting from 26 to 63 attendees. The club hosted yoga and gentle aerobics classes. And the committee started a bridge group that met six times with two tables.

The 2018 social committee has already met and laid out the 2018 social calendar. The committee is led by Duda and Barbara McGowen. All 10 members of the committee are returning.

However, the annual lobster bake is in need of two co-chairs to run the club's biggest event. Co-chairs Duda and Fred Holler are stepping down after five years. Fred has overseen the Circle of Trust where the lobsters are boiled. Joyce has done the food shopping and managed the kitchen. Both promise to guide the new co-chairs.

In the next-to-the-last social event of the year, the club will be hosting a Bowdoin College *a cappella* group, The Longfellows, this Friday. Members should bring a potluck dish — and remember the singers will be eating with us, and college students have big appetites.

Duda said the December Annual Holiday Party usually attracts about 50 people. A construction-site, propanefuelled heater runs all day, leaving the clubhouse comfortable by 4 p.m. when the festivities start. Members bring "heavy" appetizers to share, and beverages of their choice. Hot cider is supplied by the hosts. The plumbing in the clubhouse will have been turned off and drained, limiting clean-up capabilities and bathroom usage. The party ends at 6 p.m.
