While we have had crowds of 150 or more attend the annual lobster bake in the past, the social committee canceled the event this year after evaluating feedback from members about costs and caterers' expensive proposals.

The club hosted two lectures this summer. One of them, a movie-showing and discussion by filmmaker Joe Goldman about his documentary about local lobster catchers, drew 70 people, including some of the characters featured on celluloid.

Newly promoted casual Friday and Saturday evening gatherings drew 7-12 people each time she said. Weekly activities such as yoga and mahjongg "have fallen off in attendance" compared to past years, she added.

A weekend cruise in July attracted eight boats of club members. A planned successor in August was cancelled due to bad weather.

35 Volunteers Helped Sailing School

The Abbot Fletcher Sailing School achieved better-than breakeven results this summer assisted by some generous donations. Operating revenue totaled over \$31,500. In addition, a very successful online auction raised \$5,700 which goes into the school's capital reserve for replacing major equipment.

Erin Deschesne is retiring as Head Instructor after seven years of leading the program and guiding young sailors through fog, high winds, calm breezes and Covid. She began her instructor career as a junior instructor in 2009. The school is searching for a successor.

The grateful club presented her with a framed print of her cherished boat (a Marshall Cat) with a bronze plaque recognizing her service.

At the annual meeting in August, Lew Incze, speaking for the sailing school's Executive Committee, reported the school served 63 students this summer, a modest decline from past years. Of the total, 21 were children or grandchildren of OBYC members.

The remainder were from the surrounding area, illustrating the role that the school plays in club service to the community. Further evidence of that role came from 34 local businesses that donated gift certificates to the online auction.

The school spent \$12,200 from its \$26,000 reserve account to buy two new outboard engines for the chase boats. Lew reported that many boats and engines are at the end of their useful life, despite annual work parties of sailing committee members to patch and repair them. Lew said the reserve fund is sufficient to handle some needed replacements in the sailing fleet.

Some 35 club members volunteered their time and efforts in various projects for AFSS this year, he said.
