Online auction sets record

More than 50 OBYC members and friends of our sailing school bid generously on the 79 items that were offered in the AFSS auction, raising almost \$8,500.

Author Discusses Slavery and Mainers' Roles

Carol Gardener, an Alna, Maine, historian discussed the complex relationship of Maine and slavery in the pre-Civil War period. She has written a book called "Divided North: Abolition, Slavery and the Slave Trade in Maine."

Her book is a dual biography of two Portland citizens — Reuben Ruby, a black hack driver who became a leading abolitionist and Nathanael Gordon, a ship's captain who transported slaves from Africa. Gardener says that based on her research, Ruby and Gordon probably went to school together and they were both members of the Second Congregational church, although Ruby would have been forced to sit in the balcony.

Maine, as part of Massachusetts, had abolished slavery in 1776. Maine courts protected fleeing slaves from the fugitive slave act. But ship owners' trade ties with the South and the Caribbean made some Mainers hostile to abolition.

The Gordon family ignored U.S. laws prohibiting use of American ships in the slave trade. Nathanael Gordon III, a slave ship captain, was captured in the Congo by the U.S. Navy. He was hung after a trial in New York City in 1860.

"Ruby and the Gordons demonstrate the divisions of the country," Gardener said during her lecture.
